Knowledge:

Knowledge of the Old and New Testaments in terms of chronology, grammatical and semantic knowledge of particular biblical passages, trends in interpretation, the significance of the text for later theological development, and the theological system among biblical texts. Understand the development of apostolic theology in the second half of the first century in the light of the new situation of the churches. Verse by verse of a selected New Testament passage (approximately 60-80 verses) will lead the student to the contextual meaning and theological content of the text.

Skills:

Exploration of the contemporary meaning of Old and New Testament texts, possibilities for updating the original meaning, search for theological and practical application, demonstration of the importance of theological systems in later theological history. Noting the unity inherent in diversity: young Christians who encounter a myriad of new situations do not lose the message of the Gospel, but are able to reach the readers of the time by updating it. The listener is able to interpret the text not on its own, but in its narrow and wider context, taking into account the context.

Results of education: Knowledge: A summary of scholarship on the Old and New Testaments, literary criticism, historical-critical and theological problems of the biblical texts, and the theological traditions of the	

two Testaments. The student will learn about the circumstances of the origins of the Old Testament and New Testament writings, their authors, addressees, and the place and time of their composition. They will gain a factual knowledge of the books of Scripture.

Competencies:

Results of education: Knowledge:	

In this exercise, the student will learn to prepare a sermon based on the knowledge he/she has acquired previously. Practise the different stages of sermon preparation. To learn how to apply his theoretical knowledge to concrete situations of preaching, church feasts, cassuals, etc.

In the first semester of the four-semester continuous course, the student will become familiar with the foundations, basic concepts, aims and areas of catechesis, especially in the field of catechesis in principle (theological, anthropological and ecclesiological motivations for catechesis).

Knowledge of catechetics and the history of catechesis (up to the present day). This knowledge is essential for the successful study of substantive catechesis in the following semesters.

The aim of the missiology course is to familiarise students with the basic concepts of missiology, to develop an understanding of missiology through the study of biblical and historical reflections on mission. Upon completion of the course, students will gain a broad overview of the history of missiology and missionary ministry, current issues and problems, and the current state of the discipline. The curriculum provides an introduction to the different methodological approaches used in missiology.

Competencies:

The student will be able to canonize the knowledge of several theological disciplines in the preparation of a sermon. He will be able to keep the casus and the text in mind at the same time. Be able to articulate the case in a way that is relevant to the audience/congregation.

The student will be able, on the basis of the mastery of the basics, to perceive and evaluate the main areas, subject matter and possibilities of the subject; he/she will be able to determine the purpose and the essence of the catechetical work and its specific character.

The student will be oriented towards the basic concepts of missiology and will thus develop a correct theological vision of the purpose, past, present and future of mission. He/she will be able to identify and evaluate the present situation and, within it, his/her own tasks, and to reflect on what he/she can achieve in his/her field from the objectives identified in the course.

Attitudes:

During the exercise, the student develops an appropriate and adequate basic attitude as a preacher of the Word, bearing in mind the biblical and correct ecclesiological interpretation of the Word.

The student's attention is focused on a specific topic, he becomes sensitive to hitherto unknown areas and topics, recognises their topicality and importance and thus prepares himself responsibly for his practice.

Results of education: Knowledge: a) The course will enable the student to develop his/her ability to prepare and deliver a sermon in the community, with due regard to the appropriate rhetorical principles, both in terms of content and methodology. The graduate student will become familiar with a number of key, common, and	

often controversial sermon topics and will learn to prepare sermons based on a knowledge of the principles and subject matter of homiletics.

(b) During the seminar, the student will be introduced to selected topics (assigned in the appropriate year) in each area of practical theology. During the seminar work, the student will develop a methodology in working with the primary and secondary literature of the discipline. The student will expand his/her knowledge in the field of practical theology. The course instructor will select seminar topics related to the research areas in the Department of Practical Theology. The seminar sessions build on and build upon the theoretical knowledge already acquired in catechesis, and the student will gain practical experience in the field of catechesis that he/she is likely to encounter in his/her future practice.
